From The Superintendent and Board President 2009-2010 WCSD Budget

Dear Community Members:

he economic downturn has had far reaching consequences on all of us...in our personal lives...in our professional lives...and in all aspects of our everyday lives. It has created, more so than ever, the need to evaluate program offerings and to assess how services are delivered as we look for more economically efficient yet effective alternatives in, perhaps, a back to basics approach to education.

For the 2009-2010 school year, the Board of Education has adopted a proposed budget of \$178,623,391 that will be put before the voters on May 19th. It represents an increase of \$3,644,121 or 2.08% and would be the smallest budget-to-budget increase in the last 13 years. The associated tax levy increase of 2.72% would also be the lowest for the last 10 years.

A Contingency Budget has also been adopted which would be implemented, as was the case this year, should the proposed budget be rejected. The Contingency Budget is only \$401,455 (0.23%) less than the budget being proposed, with the difference representing the deletion of funding for select equipment items and student supplies as would be required by law. The tax levy increase associated with the adoption of a Contingency Budget would be 2.37%, which represents a decrease of only 0.35% when compared to that associated with the proposed budget.

The 2009-2010 Proposed Budget was arrived at as the result of a review process which began last December, during which time the Board of Education examined a number of proposed budget reduction measures and cost savings opportunities. In total, approximately \$4.4 million worth of budget reduction measures and cost savings opportunities are reflected in the proposed budget. In developing the 2009-2010 Proposed Budget, it was

necessary to not only consider the state of the current economy but also what related impacts the recession might have upon the District's financial resources in the development of future years' budgets. In this regard, we will need to heighten our focus on long-range planning in order to better prepare ourselves to address the affordability and sustainability of future budgets in our on-going efforts to strike that necessary balance between district goals, offerings, services and affordability.

the next two years. Foundation Aid represents sixty-nine percent of the \$52 million in state aid that our district estimates to receive this year.


- There is uncertainty as to how New York State will adequately fund schools when the Federal Stimulus Package expires in two years.
- The stability of the value of the District's tax base.
- A health insurance subsidy for the 2009-2010 school year which "artificially" allowed for only a 2% increase in the District's employer's health insurance contribution cost for our largest employee group.
- Debt service...after this year, based upon currently scheduled debt, payments will be gradually increasing for the foreseeable future.
- We have received notification from both retirement systems that unless investment performance improves, municipalities should be prepared for significant increases in their employer contribution rates two years from now.
- Fund balance availability

Contingency Budget

A Contingency Budget is prepared and adopted by the Board when the voters have rejected the proposed budget. The Board of Education may present a proposed budget to the community only twice.

The total spending authorization imposed under a Contingency Budget is limited by formula. The increase over the previous year's budget may not exceed the lesser of either: (1) 4%; or (2) the result obtained when multiplying the national average consumer price index by 120%. For the 2009 – 2010 school year, a consumer price index of 3.8 % equates to a maximum authorized increase of 4.0%.

Based upon the budget adopted by the Board of Education and taking into account the types of expenditures that can legally be used to modify this formula, the Contingency Budget calculated for the 2009-2010 school year would be set at \$178,221,936. If the proposed budget is defeated, the budget items in the table below would be


