ummer has ended and once again we find ourselves facing a new school year. This is always a time of renewal and anticipation. We have an opportunity to start fresh, "clean the slate," and perhaps approach things differently. This may be a time

for a new beginning, but what does stay constant is our responsibility to educate the children placed in our trust. That's our core purpose and we are ready to welcome our children to our schools. We will continue to provide them with the quality education they require and deserve.

There have been many changes in our administration over the summer. We welcome our new administrators: Marco Pochintesta, Assistant Superintendent for Administration; Kathleen Walsh, Assistant Superintendent for Curriculum and Instruction; Eleanore DiCioccio, Principal of Orchard View Alternative High School; Sydnie Vasquez, Principal of Myers Corners Elementary School; Bonnie

King, Assistant Principal at John Jay High School; Caroline Pidala, Assistant Principal at Roy C. Ketcham High School; and David Seipp, Assistant Coordinator for

Physical Education, Health and Athletics. We are currently conducting searches for new principals at John Jay High School and Sheafe Road Elementary School, business manager and director of facilities. More information regarding these wonderful, new administrators is included in this issue of In Print and will be included in future issues.

We will be facing great challenges this year. We

have not experienced any significant relief from the many mandates imposed on us by the state and federal governments. At the same time, we are not getting the level of financial support we require to implement those mandates. Over the past few months, we were hopeful that we would see at least some partial restoration of state aid as the legislature continued to work on the state budget. When the state budget was finally approved, the \$6.1 million cut in funding for our school District remained. I was contacted by the media and asked, "So, now that there will be no restoration of the reduction in state aid, what are you going to do?" I responded, "We will stick to our plan because we built our budget taking into account the full cut in state aid; our plan stands."

And that is important to remember. I know that many people in our educational community felt a great sense of pride when our budget passed by a wide margin this past May. That was a great experience and I thank everyone for supporting our schools. However, we cannot be lulled into a false sense that everything is now fine. It is not. The bud-

> get that was approved contained significant reductions in programs and staff and we are now feeling the effects of that as we begin the new school year. It may sound

cliché, but, we do indeed have to "do more with less." Things are going to be a bit tougher than before. The class sizes we are accustomed to will be higher in some cases and services such as the late bus, non-mandated academic intervention services, certain activities and other programs and services will not be available. It's simply not "busi-

ness as usual." All I can do is ask everyone to hang on and do the best that you can. WCSD is made up of amazing people and I am confident that together we will rise to the occasion.

I want to take this opportunity to make a few points about school taxes. The Poughkeepsie Journal just published an article that indicated WCSD's tax rate increased by 15 percent. Please be advised that a tax rate is very different than a tax levy. A tax rate takes into account property assessments and tax ratios that are determined by the individual towns. The tax levy is the total amount to be raised in taxes. The tax levy approved by the Board of Education was exactly as it was presented in our budget, 9.53 percent. Moreover, our estimate of the average school tax increase for homeowners in our school District, \$324, was on target. In fact, in two towns it was lower; E. Fishkill Homestead: \$296; Wappingers Homestead: \$246 and Fishkill Homestead: \$335. Remember, depending on factors such as assessments, some increases will be lower and some higher.

There is some good news regarding resources. I expect that once our independent, annual audit is completed we will see an improvement in our financial condition. Also, a federal bill was passed giving school districts funding to restore teaching positions that were eliminated due to budget cuts. It has been reported that our school District will receive about \$2.8 million to be used over a two year period. However, we do not have final confirmation of that amount nor any details regarding when the funds will arrive or any guidelines regarding implementation. When the particulars are known, I will share them with all of you. Assuming we do get this funding, I plan to recommend to our Board of Education that we use part of it to restore positions and reserve part of it for next year to maintain those positions. After all, we must be mindful that we will be losing our federal Stimulus Funding next year. I also want to mention that New York State

was finally approved for the federal "Race to the Top" initiative. Again, we do not have details about this at this time. Based on the limited information we have, our share may be about \$280,000.

This spring we will see changes in New York State assessments. Revisions will be made in the grade 3 through 8 testing program in English Language Arts and mathematics. Moreover, we all know by now that the state has changed its grading scale for the 2009-2010 tests our students have taken in English language arts and mathematics. These tests are not scored the way typical teacher tests are scored. For example, for a typical test, a student answers correctly 20 of 25 questions and receives a score of 80 percent. In state tests, the number of questions that students answer correctly throughout the state is analyzed, and then the state prepares a table which allows an individual student's results to be labeled as 1 - 4, with 1 being the lowest. The state has made the curve far less generous than previous years with the result being the deflation of student scores all across the state. Because of these changes, it will not be as meaningful to compare scores from the previous year with the same tests last spring. As I wrote in a previous message, the state testing program must be viewed with much skepticism since the same scores can be manipulated to have students pass or fail. We will do our best to explain this to help parents and students understand what the results mean. We must remember that any tests should be used to help our children grow and improve in their learning.

The Board of Education and I have toured our buildings and grounds and we praise our custodial, maintenance and clerical staff for doing a good job in getting our schools ready for opening day. However, it is painfully clear that we need to address our deteriorating infrastructure. Our schools are in need of much refurbishment; windows, doors, flooring, ceilings, lighting, electrical and heating systems, fire alarms, lockers, asphalt paving, brick pointing and more. This must be a priority for all of us. We have a responsibility to properly maintain the buildings and grounds in our school District that belong

to our taxpayers. We must ensure that our buildings and grounds are in good condition to serve future generations of students. Work has already commenced to address this concern. Our Facilities and Operations Committee, consisting of administrators, maintenance personnel and Board Members, Mr. John McMahon (Chair), Mrs. Marilynn Shultz and Mr. John Lumia, have been exploring Performance Contracting which may enable us to complete much needed work that can be paid for from the energy savings realized. In addition, the Board of Education has approved an architectural/ engineering firm, Tetra Tech, to complete a Building Condition Survey that must be on file with the State Education Department this January. The Building Condition Survey will consist of an analysis of every school in the District and serve as the foundation for updating our five year facilities plan.

I am pleased to report that our summer school program was successful. Five hundred seventeen students participated in grades 7-12. Our passing rate for grades 9-12 was 90 percent. Just as the program was about to commence, the Board of Education decided to open it to 7th grade students who were scheduled to be retained. This was possible because no additional costs would be incurred due to a lower than expected enrollment in grades 8-12. Twenty-two 7th grade students participated in summer school and 100 percent of them passed and were able to be promoted! All of our 8th grade students also passed and moved on to high school. Congratulations to all the students, teachers, staff, Board of Education and especially Mr. Roger DeHay, summer school principal, on a job well done.

Thanks to Mr. Jeff Behnke, our continuing education coordinator, our new driver education program was launched successfully this summer. One hundred forty-seven students participated in the program, with a completion rate of 100 percent. That means that these students will be better drivers and qualify for significant decreases in their car insurance premiums. The cost of the program

was \$375 per student, one of the lowest in surrounding areas. We look forward to continuing this program throughout the school year at no cost to the taxpayers.

There are many curriculum and instruction initiatives underway in our school District. I'm not going to write about all of them. I do want to mention just a few. We are going to map our curriculum so that it is consistent throughout the school District in every subject and at every grade level. Curriculum mapping also ensures that we have a curriculum that is in alignment with state standards and assessments. We will also continue the implementation of Response to Intervention, a federally mandated process for ensuring we are using research-based instructional strategies to meet the needs of our students. WCSD receives ENERGY STAR Partner of the Year Award

or the past 23 months, the Wappingers Central School District has been implementing a rigorous energy savings program with the guidance of Energy Education, a company that specializes in people-driven energy conservation

for school districts, universities, colleges, and large churches. Energy Education provides training and expertise to the District's energy manager, Jill Matera. In 2009 and 2010, WCSD received the ENERGY STAR Partner of the Year award from the United States Environmental Protection Agency.



We determined to undertake this conservation effort because energy costs are rising and our utility costs and the operation of our plant are second only to salaries and benefits in our annual budget.

Energy Education has a national record of reducing energy costs for districts like ours. In fact, they guarantee savings. Our goal was simple, yet challenging: Dramatically reduce our energy consumption and therefore the cost of our utilities without affecting the comfort of our schools and classrooms. I am pleased to report our efforts are succeeding and we are realizing significant financial savings.

Since our conservation program began, our District has saved over \$880,000. That amount is equal to this year's budget for 12,570 textbooks. We have literally cut our energy consumption by 21.5 percent. We have done this by improving the way our equipment runs, following a set of guidelines designed to make everyone aware of how we use energy, and educating students and staff on the benefits of energy conservation. And we expect these savings to grow as we further refine our pro-

gram. But it's more than financial savings. We are helping preserve the environment. According to the EPA, our decrease in energy use is the equivalent of taking 640 cars off our local roads or planting 91, 212 trees in our community.

Our energy conservation program has been so successful we were recently notified that seven schools in the Wappingers Central School District have received the prestigious ENERGY STAR Label from the federal government's ENERGY STAR Program. The Wappingers schools that received the

ENERGY STAR Label include John Jay High School, Roy C. Ketcham High School, Van Wyck Junior High, Myers Corners Elementary, Oak Grove Elementary, Sheafe Road Elementary, and Brinckerhoff Elementary. To be recognized with an ENERGY STAR Label, school buildings must rate in the top 25 percent nationwide for energy efficiency.

We are honored by ENERGY STAR's recognition of our conservation success. Our District's sense of accomplishment is gratifying. Our teachers, staff, school board, and especially our Facilities and Operations Department deserve a lot of credit for committing to this program and making it successful.

Each of you played a role in our success and I ask that you continue to be part of our conservation team.

Our efforts will continue through the future because our taxpayers, teachers, parents, and students deserve to see every dollar possible sent to the classroom.

Oak Grove Elementary teacher receives recognition from White House

he National Medal of Science was established in 1959 by the 86th Congress as a Presidential Award to be given to individuals "deserving of special recognition by reason of their outstanding contributions to knowledge in the physical, biological, mathematical, or engineering sciences." In 1980, Congress augmented the list to include social and behavioral sciences. It is our nation's highest honor for American scientists and engineers.

Since its creation, the National Medal of Science has been awarded to 458 distinguished scientists and engineers whose careers spanned decades of research and development. Nominations are accepted by all sources, but must meet a list of criteria, including three letters of reference. A committee of 12 scientists and engineers is appointed by the president to evaluate the nominees for the award.

As President Obama proclaims his commitment to reforming the nation's struggling education system, he realizes that the work begins as a co-creative process between teachers and students on all levels, especially commencing in the early years. Last spring, Oak Grove teacher Caitlin McCabe and her class were chosen to be highlighted on the White House Web site because of her innovative approach to teaching. McCabe and her fifth-grade class created their own unique Medal of Science Award as a class project in order to promote interest in the sciences and keep

students engaged in learning. McCabe's students researched and learned about many different famous scientists and decided who they thought deserved the National Medal of Science Award, and subsequently drafted a formal nomination. It was prepared and presented as though it was to be submitted to the National Science Foundation (NSF).

McCabe was very excited with the process, and actually contacted and submitted the nominations to the NSF. Mayra Montrose, the program manager at NSF, answered all of the children's nomination letters and presented NSF patches and rulers to each student.

The children in McCabe's classroom chose the top three winners: first place, Ralph Baer (the father of video games); second place, Walt Disney; third place, Hippocrates.

New driver's education program a tremendous success

Wappingers Central School District is offering a driver's education program again after a 30-year respite. Jeff Behnke, coordinator of the WCSD Drivers Education Department, said the course was originally cut years ago due to budget constraints. However, on February 22, 2010, the NYS Department of Motor Vehicles issued mandatory requirements for students who wish to obtain their senior driver's license at the age of 17. Behnke and Superintendent of Schools James Parla thought it was the right time to revive the program for convenience to students and parents. The District has contracted with the American Driving Academy (ADA) of Hopewell Junction to provide the in-car portion of the program to it's students.

Two driver's education sessions were offered during the summer that proved to be successful. A 16-week fall session began on September 10. The fee for a full session is \$375, which includes a 90-minute classroom lecture and a 90-minute driving experience for each class session. All students must reside within the Wappingers School District boundaries, be at least 16 years of age, and have a NYS learner's permit. Attendance for all sessions is mandatory in order to be eligible for the senior license. Behnke remarks, "We are very excited to offer this program to our high school students. Initially, 48-hours of instruction may seem like a large commitment but the benefits to the students who learn to drive properly will not only save them money but could be life-saving as well."

New York State is one of the 46 states that has adopted a three-stage Graduated Driver's License (GDL) law. You may read about specific requirements at http://www.nydmv.state.ny.us/ youngerdriver/gradLicense.htm.

Young, inexperienced drivers, particularly 16-to 17-year-olds, die too often in fatal crashes, in large part because of immaturity and inexperience. Three-stage GDL laws reduce these factors by reducing high-risk exposure for young drivers. According to the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration analysis, GDL laws have helped reduce crashes for this age group anywhere between 20 and 40 percent.

Ongoing classes will be offered, with a new session planned for early February 2011. Information will be posted on the WCSD Web site at the end of November. A course application, as well as additional information, is available at www.wappingersschools.org by clicking on the "Driver's Education" link on the left. This course does not result in high school credit.

On Friday, September 10, 2010, much of the school day at Orchard View was centered on the observance of the ninth anniversary of the terrorist attacks on America. These artifacts included several newspapers from 9/11 and the following days, pieces of concrete and an office paper from "7 World Trade Center", obtained when Perino visited Ground Zero on September 16, 2001. Hopefully, this type of observance will always be part of the beginning of the school year. We must never forget.

School bus rules and safety tips

As your professional school transportation provider, we want to make sure that your child's trip to and from school is safe and enjoyable. We all play a role in achieving this goal. In order to get your child to school safely, on-time, and ready to learn, it is important that your child understands the school bus safety rules. Please discuss the rules listed below with your child.

- · Stay in your seat
- · Keep noise level down
- Keep head, hands and feet inside the bus
- Don't throw things inside the bus or out of the windows
- No eating or drinking on the bus
- Keep the bus clean
- No smoking or tobacco use on the bus
- Don't be destructive; respect your bus and the property of fellow students
- Be courteous
- Cooperate with the bus driver
- Remember the "I See You,
 You See Me Rule" As students enter or exit a bus they
 must move to and/or from a
 safe distance (15 feet away
 from the bus). It is important
 that the driver can always
 keep students in sight.

- Students must approach the bus in the "safety zone" (the area in a direct visual line to the door).
- Do not try to get anything you left on the bus after you have already exited. We will do our best to ensure that personal property is returned
- Do not try to pick up anything dropped underneath the bus – property can be replaced, children cannot!
- Always follow the driver's directions about crossing the street. Be alert—look both ways!
- Always walk in front of the bus!

Van Wyck JHS Initiates a One Book, One School Program

n anti-bullying initiative is underway in many schools throughout the country. With the increased need to improve literacy skills nationwide on the forefront of education and to promote the anti-bullying initiative, I decided that it would be a great idea to incorporate reading a fiction book about bullying as a One Book, One School Program. I approached my Principal, Steve Shuchat, with the idea and he was interested in moving forward with it. I also approached Cassie Horton, reading specialist at WJHS, with the idea and WJHS will initiate the program as well.

The notion of the One Book Program was originally created as a One Book One Community Program by public librarians to increase literacy communitywide within generally urban areas. The idea of the program is to engage community members of all ages to read one chosen literary selection. With the One Book One School Program, we are engaging all students, faculty, staff and administrators in a school community to read. All levels of "readers" will share their own personal insights as to what they gathered from the book. With the act of bullying being such a huge issue, it made sense to make a literary selection that would incorporate this topic.

The book chosen is called *Egghead* by Caroline Pignat. The book describes several 9th graders as the protagonists: Will (the bullied), Shane (the bully) Katie (the nice girl who tries to befriend Will), and Devan (an unwilling part of Shane's bullyboy team). The teens are struggling to deal with life in general, how not to be a bystander to bullying, how to stand up for your friends, and how to deal with rage that can be all consuming.

Each ELA teacher in the building will be given a copy of the book and will read the book aloud to students during the first part of ELA classes. Students will discuss the book in class and then will share their ideas with other classes on the Van Wyck JHS One Book One School wiki. Once everyone has read the book, Van Wyck and WJHS will videoconference. An author videoconference is also planned.
