

PSAT/NMSQT Registration and Test Day Information

The PSAT/NMSQT will be offered on Saturday, **October 19, 2019**.

The PSAT begins at 7:30. Students taking this test should arrive at least 15 minutes early to find their testing location. Lists are posted alphabetically in the main lobby. ID is required.

Registration

Register with Mrs. Jakuba in the 9th grade suite, room 223, using the PSAT registration form. You must bring a check or money order for \$17 made out to WCSD. Please check that the form and the check are complete before you hand it in, so there is no delay in your registration. **Registration dates are October 1st-October 16th.**

Test Day

There are only a few things you really need to bring on test day and a lot of things you'll be better off leaving at home.

What to Bring

- Two No. 2 pencils with erasers
- An approved calculator
- Valid school- or government-issued photo ID (for students not testing at their own school and home-schooled students).
- Social Security number (optional)

What Not to Bring

- Any devices, including smartwatches, that can be used to record, transmit, receive or play back audio, photographic, text, or video content
- Protractors, compasses, rulers
- Highlighters, colored pens, colored pencils
- Pamphlets or papers of any kind
- Dictionaries or other books—there are no exceptions, even if English is not your first language
- Food and drinks—including bottled water—unless approved by the College Board's Services for Students with Disabilities.

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Requesting Testing Accommodations

If you have a documented disability, you may be eligible for accommodations when you take the PSAT/NMSQT or PSAT 10. Some available accommodations are extended time, extra and extended breaks, and reading and seeing accommodations (for example, large-type or Braille test books).

Approval Is Required

Accommodations must be approved by the College Board's Services for Students with Disabilities for students taking the PSAT/NMSQT and PSAT 10 (as well as other College Board assessments including, but not limited to, the SAT, SAT Subject Tests and AP Exams). Scores will be canceled if accommodations are used without College Board approval.

Start Early

It can take about seven weeks for an accommodations request to be processed. See your school counselor early to start the process with plenty of time to spare. Your counselor will give you a release form to complete so your request can be submitted to the College Board Services for Students with Disabilities.
