In the event that a student does not take the AP exam, the student's report card and transcript will reflect only a course in Honors.

## Welcome back students:

A new school year has arrived and I want to welcome you back hoping that you enjoyed the summer and that you are looking forward, as I am, to a very successful and exciting academic year. As your teacher, I expect you to set positive, attainable academic goals.

## Course Content:

The level 5AP course is a language intensive college level course. This course is also considered an Honors class and thus it is weighted as such. As a college level course, all topics listed under Checkpoint C of the NYS Foreign Language Objectives will be covered in preparation for the AP exam in May. The AP Spanish Language exam is a very demanding exam. Success in the AP requires an intensive two-year preparation which began in level 4. The intensity of this level will require you, the student, to take responsibility for your own learning. It is expected that you have learned the basic grammatical topics and vocabulary covered in levels 1 through 4. The structures covered in levels 1-4 will be quickly reviewed and new structures will be introduced and explained in detail. However, all conjugations will be learned and practiced at home so that we may use class time to effectively clarify any confusion in the uses of some of the most difficult structures.

As always, vocabulary will play an extremely important part throughout the entire course. The course will center around authentic reading and audio materials from the textbook, magazines, internet and short stories.

<u>Spanish will be used in class at all times during class and outside of class</u>. I fully expect that your participation will likewise be in Spanish. Always!! Don't expect to be perfect. It's OK to make mistakes--just try to say what you need to say in Spanish by the use of circumlocution. Communication is our primary goal, not perfection. I will not respond to your questions if you speak to me in English, so you are going to have to try to communicate in Spanish! Have faith in yourself; you know more than you realize. Take a moment to think about what you want to say, then say it in Spanish. Your <u>active participation</u> in all class activities will help you to have a successful, and hopefully, enjoyable experience and it is very important in preparation for success on the new Advanced Placement exam.

Please understand that this course does not follow the same structure that you may find in levels 1 through 4. The preparation for the AP exam must be quite different to achieve our goal. As such the testing will also be different. Thus you will not find the usual fill-in the blank types of questions. You will be asked to read, listen and synthesize information to formulate your responses in both written and oral forms.

## Course requirements:

- 1. **notebook** I strongly recommend a three ring binder. There will be many handouts given throughout the year. The binder will help keep you organized.
- 2. textbooks Conexiones Comunicación y Cultura, AP Spanish Review, Abriendo Paso and Una Vez Más.

# <u>Course grading:</u> TESTS + QUIZZES + HOMEWORK + CLASS PARTICIPATION = QUARTER GRADE

Expected distribution of grades: (This can change depending on the work assigned) Tests and Projects- 25%, Quizzes- 25%, Homework- 25%, Participation- 25% Oral grades are included as quiz grades unless they are part of a major test or project.

All homework will be posted on my website and announced in class daily. Make sure that you visit the website daily. If you do not have access to the internet at home, you may check the website at the beginning or at the end of class on the classroom's computer. My website address is http://www.wappingersschools.org/229320615125029947/. Each homework assignment counts toward the homework grade. If you do 30 assignments out of 30, then you will receive a 100% for your homework grade. If your assignment is not complete, you will not receive credit. In addition, homework less than half complete receives no credit. I cannot emphasize enough the importance of doing the homework consistently and thoroughly. All tests and quizzes reflect the work covered in class and reviewed at home. If you understand the homework, you will experience success on the tests and guizzes. You will also have unannounced quizzes based on the homework assigned on a regular basis.

Class participation is extremely important. I keep track of everything you do in class. Going to the board and volunteering answers are two simple ways of receiving checks in this area. These checks will count towards your grade. If you don't participate, you won't be able to do the homework assignments, and you won't be able to pass the tests and quizzes.

## Make-ups:

It is **your** responsibility to see that you are current on all assignments, tests, etc., not the teacher's. Makeup's are to be done within two days of a legal absence. Any exceptions must be discussed with me BEFORE the work is late. **NO MAKEUP = ZERO. CUTTING CLASS = ZERO.** 

If you are absent, I expect that you will find out the assignments due by either checking the website, calling a classmate or e-mailing me. When you return from an absence, I expect to see all work due on that day unless you have made arrangements with me. You will be expected to take any quizzes that are based on the homework assigned for that date. Thus, being absent on the previous day is not an excuse. Please note that, last minute changes may not be available on the website. I will **not** accept late assignments. Make use of my e-mail address at senorabeiner@gmail.com. Failure to hand in a project on time will result in a zero (0). I will not accept late projects. You will have plenty of time to do any assigned projects and to do them right!

Con las actividades de *Abriendo paso: Lectura y Gramática*, practicaremos todas las habilidades para pasar el examen de A.P. en mayo. Se incluirán **actividades auténticas** de estos dos libros para desarrollar las

habilidades de **hablar**, **escribir**, **leer**, **escuchar**, y **analizar** en **registros diferentes** (en situaciones formales e informales) para que sepan usar el vocabulario apropiado para audiencias diferentes. Enfatizaremos la **gramática** apropiada, y leeremos de una variedad de **obras literarias** en español.

A partir de marzo, usaremos el libro *Advanced Placement Spanish: Preparing for the Language Examination, 3rd Edition* (José Díaz, et. al, Pearson Prenctice Hall, 2007), el que nos dará práctica directa para el examen en mayo. Dear parents and guardians:

Your child is enrolled in the Spanish 5AP course. Advanced Placement Spanish Language is intended for students who wish to develop their proficiency in all four language skills: listening, speaking, reading and writing. This course prepares students for the AP Spanish Language Examination that attempts to evaluate levels of performance in the use of the language, both in understanding written and spoken Spanish and in writing and speaking with ease in correct and idiomatic Spanish.

Students should already have a basic knowledge of the language and culture of Spanishspeaking people and should have attained a reasonable proficiency in listening comprehension, speaking, reading and writing. Extensive training in the organization and writing of compositions will be an integral part of the AP Spanish Language course.

Reading is the foremost vocabulary builder; it makes the language and culture come alive. Students will become critical readers, and must be able to summarize accurately an argument they have read, locate the thesis of an argument, analyze, evaluate, and account for discrepancies among various readings on a topic. The vocabulary will be based on the standard lexicon used in all Spanish-speaking countries. The readings are very diverse in content and authorship. The students will be provided with strategies to improve their reading skills, such as scanning, skimming, and decoding.

As thoughtful writers, students should be able to write effectively, present information in an orderly and coherent way, incorporate sources, into their own writing, and to develop a thoughtful argument of their own.

As far as the grammatical aspect of the course, the explanations of structure will be brief and clear, to enable students to concentrate on the structural practice for maximum efficiency in learning. The exercises will directly follow the points of grammar to which they apply.

The College Board, a national nonprofit membership association whose mission is to prepare, inspire, and connect students to college opportunity, as well as John Jay High School are committed to the principle that all students deserve an opportunity to participate in rigorous and academically challenging courses and programs. Our students, by taking The Advanced Placement Spanish Language course and passing the corresponding exam in **May**, will earn college credits while still in high school.

The Advanced Placement Spanish Language course covers the equivalent of a third-yearcollege course in advanced Spanish writing and conversation. It encompasses aural/oral skills, reading comprehension, grammar, and composition. Students taking this course, emphasizing the use of Spanish for active communication, have the following objectives:

- The ability to comprehend formal and informal spoken Spanish.
- The acquisition of vocabulary and a grasp of structure to allow the easy, accurate reading of newspaper and magazine articles, as well as modern literature in Spanish.
- The skill to compose expository passages.

• The aptitude to express ideas orally with accuracy and fluency.

The course content will best reflect intellectual interests shared by the students and teacher (the arts, literature, drama, poems, acting, music, history, current events, oral presentations, guided discussions. etc.). Therefore the grammar, vocabulary and orthography will be covered in context.

As you can see, this course will be quite differently than your child's previous Spanish courses. The intensity of this level will require your child to take responsibility for his/her own learning.
