



PBIS LAUNCH

PBIS (Positive Behavioral Interventions and Supports) refers to a systems change process for the entire school. The underlying theme is teaching behavioral expectations in the same manner as any core curriculum subject. All PBIS practices are founded on the assumption and belief that all children can exhibit appropriate behavior. As a result, it is our responsibility to identify the contextual setting events and environmental conditions that enable ex-

hibition of appropriate behavior. We then must determine the means and systems to provide those resources.



Our first day we launched our school wide expectations. The

wide expectations. They are as stated:

CAFETERIA EXPECTATIONS

<u>Be Responsible-</u> Stay with your group, clean up your area, and raise your hand before you leave the table.

Be Respectful- Voice level 2, listen to the lunch monitor, thank the staff that help you.

Be Safe- Stay in your seat, walk in the cafeteria.

BUS EXPECTATIONS

<u>Be Responsible-</u> Stay seated in your assigned area, report any problems immediately, do not eat or drink on the bus.

Be Respectful-Voice level 2, listen to the bus driver, and use appropriate language.

Be Safe- Keep hands, feet, and objects to yourself.

HALLWAY EXPECTATIONS

Be Responsible-Stay with your group, keep your school clean.

Be Respectful- Voice level 0, Smile or wave to others, admire work and displays.

<u>Be Safe-</u> Keep hands, feet, and objects to yourself, take on stair at a time, quiet walking feet, stay on right side of the hall and stairs.

Please review these expectations with your children. We will also be giving weekly and classroom awards for students that exhibits the six pillars of good character; respect, responsibility, caring, trustworthiness, citizenship & fairness.

The first month of school we will be highlighting the pillar of respect. We will discuss the importance of respecting yourself and others in your school, home and community.

ANTI-BULLYING PARENT AND TEACHER COMMITTEE

A new parent committee this year will be the anti-bullying committee. It is important that the school and parents work together to create an atmosphere free from bullying. The effects of bullying can be substantial for students. Our first meeting is on Tuesday, September 25th at 8:00 a.m.

All parents are welcome and encouraged to attend. The goal of the committee is to discuss strategies and ways to prevent bullying at Evans.

All of students will sign an anti-bullying pledge the first week of school. This will set the tone and bring awareness to the importance of a bully free school.

ANTI-BULLYING PLEDGE

"I agree to stamp out bullying and all forms of violence. I believe that everyone should be able to enjoy our school equally, feel safe, secure, and accepted regardless of ethnicity, gender, popularity, athletic ability, intelligence, religion or nationality."

COMMON CORE STANDARDS

All teachers will be implementing the common core standards this year. The common core standards are internationally benchmarked, aligned with work and post-secondary education expectations, and inclusive of the higher order skills that students need. At Parents for Partners Night, the teachers will be highlighting the standards and discussing the expectations at each specific grade level. Below are a list of the ELA College and Career Readiness Anchor Standards for Reading

Key Ideas and Details

- 1. Read closely to determine what the text says explicitly and to make logical inferences from it; cite specific textual evidence when writing or speaking to support conclusions drawn from the text.
- 2. Determine central ideas or themes of a text and analyze their development; summarize the key supporting details and ideas.
- 3. Analyze how and why individuals, events, and ideas develop and interact over the course of a text.

Craft and Structure

- 4. Interpret words and phrases as they are used in a text, including determining technical, connotative, and figurative meanings, and analyze how specific word choices shape meaning or tone.

STUDENT DROP-OFF PROCEDURES

Just a reminder for all parents regarding the procedures for dropping a student off in the morning for school:

- All cars need to go through the center parking lot. No drop offs are allowed in front of the building in the circle unless it is after 9:15 am.
- Cars must wait in a single file line. Do not pull up alongside another car (double parking) that is dropping off a student.
- Children should get out of the doors facing the building so that they do not need to walk around the car. Students should be prepared to exit the car as soon as the vehicle stops.
- Parking is not allowed in the center of the parking lot. Parents do not have to get out of their car or stay to watch students go into the building. There are staff members to cross the children and keep them safe.
- If you need to park, proceed to the lower, side parking lot.
- Children are <u>only</u> to be dropped off at the crosswalk. Please do not drop them off at the corner of the parking lot.

Please help us keep your children safe by following the rules on this sheet. Safety, not speed, is the main concern. Thanks for your cooperation.

TRUSTWORTHINESS: Be honest - don't deceive, cheat, or steal - Be reliable - do what you say you'll do - Have the courage to do the right thing - Build a good reputation - Be loyal - Stand by your family, friends, and country

RESPECT: Treat others with respect; follow the Golden rule, Be tolerant and accepting of differences, Use good manners, not bad language, Be considerate of the feelings of others, Don't threaten, hit or hurt anyone, Deal peacefully with anger, insults, and disagreements

RESPONSIBILITY: Do what you are supposed to do, Plan ahead, Persevere; keep on trying! Always do your best, Use self control, Be self-disciplined, Think before you act, consider the consequences, Be accountable for your words, actions, and attitudes, Set a good example for others

FAIRNESS: Play by the rules, Take turns and share, Be open-minded; listen to others, Don't take advantage of others, Don't blame others carelessly, Treat all people fairly

CARING: Be kind, Be compassionate and show you care, Express gratitude, Forgive others, Help people in need

CITIZENSHIP: Do your share to make your school and community better, Cooperate, Get involved in community affairs, Stay informed; vote, Be a good neighbor, Obey laws and rules, Respect authority, protect the environment, volunteer.
