Trombone? Violin? Clarinet?

Consider style, cost before choosing an instrument

Choosing the right instrument for yourself is a challenge, but it is important so that you can fulfill your passion for music and enjoy playing.

First, ask yourself, "What kind of music do you like?" For example, it could be jazz, rock, hip-hop, country, etc. Each type of music has a specific instrument to make the sound you like. Before you pick the right one, try



experimenting with a variety of instruments to find the one you truly enjoy.

Next, you have to find out the cost of your instrument. The price depends on how complex the instrument is and what associate cost is with certain instruments such as tune, picks, and lessons. For classical instruments, rental programs are good if you are not sure what instrument you want to play. You have the option to rent an instrument for a school year, extend it for another year, or trade it in for another instrument. You can also buy the instrument if you are certain it is the right one for you.

Finally, you have to ask yourself, "How does my brain work and what are my physical abilities?" Playing an instrument is very much a physical activity; some instruments use more muscles than others, while others require fine motor skills. If you know that, you are very close to choosing the right instrument.

Playing an instrument helps you relieve stress, and improve your memory and patience, so make sure you choose the right one.

- Once you've chosen your instrument and have started to lessons, make sure you pay attention, work hard, and practice. This way you'll be good in no time.
