Introduction

The Wappingers Central School District is committed to maintaining a safe and effective learning environment for all students in our schools. A school's primary concern in establishing a Code of Conduct is to enable our young people to feel and be safe as well as become responsible, respectful and caring citizens within the school and community settings. An orderly educational environment requires that everyone in the school community play a role in contributing to an effective learning environment.

Dignity for All Students Act (DASA)

The Dignity for All Students Act focuses on ensuring that our schools are a safe place and that students know they are protected from certain types of behavior. All students are expected to behave respectfully toward each other and toward school staff.

All students have the right to enjoy their education without worrying about unkind words or actions from others. No student should be

discriminated against based on actual or perceived race, color, weight, national origin, ethnic group, religion, religious practice, disability, sexual orientation, gender or sex on school property or at any school function.

If anyone is making a student feel unsafe, bullied, threatened or harassed we urge the student or parents to contact the schools Dignity Act Coordinator as listed above, or you can report incidents to any adult in the school and they will follow up with the Dignity Act Coordinator.

Reporting

Students are expected to tell an adult whenever you see another student not following the Code of Conduct. It is important our young learners understand the difference between **Telling** and **Tattling**. **Telling is when**

RESPONSIBILITIES OF STUDENTS:

Students attend school so that they may realize their potential. With this in mind, each student is expected:

- 1. to be familiar with and abide by all district policies, rules and regulations pertaining to student conduct;
- 2. to work to the best of his/her ability in all academic and extracurricular pursuits and strive toward the highest level of achievement possible;
- 3. to be in regular attendance at school and in class;
- 4. to contribute to the maintenance of an environment that is conducive to learning and to show due respect to other persons and to property;
- 5. to dress in accordance with standards promulgated by the Board and the Superintendent;
- 6. to make constructive contributions to the school, and to report fairly the circumstances of school-related issues.

you want to help either yourself or others, as opposed to Tattling, which is reporting an issue just to get someone in

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trouble. Teachers, Assistant Principals, authorized school officials, and the building Principal will give out consequences for breaking the rules of our Code of Conduct. Parents and guardians will be notified about the rules a student has broken.

Dress Code

Students and their parents have the primary responsibility for acceptable student dress and appearance. The purpose of a dress code is to ensure student safety and to maintain a focus on the educational process. The following are considered to be inappropriate and are prohibited in school or at school functions:

- 1. Any dress or appearance which advocates discrimination or denigrates others based upon race, color, creed, religion, national origin, gender, sexual orientation or disability;
- 2. Any dress or appearance which encourages or advocates the use of drugs, alcohol, and/or tobacco;
- 3. Any dress or appearance which encourages illegal or violent activities;
- 4. Any dress or appearance which constitutes a threat or danger to the health and safety of students (ie: gang wear, heavy jewelry or jewelry with spikes or chains which can injure the students or others);
- 5. Any dress or appearance which allows sight of midriff, or any undergarments;
- 6. Any dress or appearance, exclusive of religious or medical reasons, that hides or changes a student's identity (ex. Masks, sunglasses, hoods, etc.);
- 7. Any dress or appearance which, in the judgment of the school administration, may be reasonably forecast to cause a material or substantial disruption;

Student Discipline

Wappingers CSD operates under a progressive discipline model. School officials who are authorized to discipline students may question a student about any alleged violations of the law or Code of Conduct.

In addition, school property is subject to search by school officials at any time. Elementary schools are committed to cooperating with police officials and Child Protective Services. Students who are found to have violated the District's

Code of Conduct may be subject to a range of penalties as outlined in the Discipline section of our Code of Conduct.

Visitors

All persons on school property or attending a school function shall conduct themselves in a respectful and orderly manner. All persons visiting our schools must scan their photo ID in the provided visitor management system to sign-in, and be issued a visitor's permit which must be displayed at all times. Visitors whose identity cannot be confirmed will be asked to leave the premises. Visitors are expected to conduct themselves in a manner that does not disrupt the academic process, violate the privacy rights of others, and are in accordance with the law, and our Code of Conduct.
