

Huber elected mayor of Wappingers Falls

Village of Wappingers Falls registered voters elected a new mayor on March 21. Kevin Huber was elected. He received 267 votes (123 on the Democratic line and 144 on the Republican line) to win the position of mayor. Current Mayor Rick Cerino received 87 write-in votes. Huber ran on the Democratic and Republican lines.

Joseph Nicholas received 106 votes in Ward 1. He was on the Democratic and Republican lines. He received 51 votes on the Democratic line and 55 on the Republican line.

Michael Ruffen, was on the Republican line. He received 61 total votes. Ruffen

will represent Ward 2. Eleven votes were from the Democratic line and 50 on the Republican line.

John Tyliszczak received a total of 126 votes to represent Ward 3. He received 67 votes on the Democratic line and 59 on the Republican line. He was on the Democratic and Republican lines.

Judge Raymond C. Chase Jr. was re-elected with 300 votes. He received 142 votes on the Democratic line and 158 on the Republican line. He was on the Democratic and Republican lines.

Ribbon cutting, tours, job fair at BOCES Salt Point Campus April 15

Dutchess BOCES will be celebrating the completion of its "One Campus" Capital Project on Saturday, April 15 and the public is invited to tour the schools and visit a job fair after a ribbon cutting.

The Dutchess BOCES Board of Trustees, the agency's leadership, and students will cut a ceremonial ribbon at 9:30 a.m. at the new shared entrance for the Alternative High School and the Career and Technical Institute (CTI) located at the back of the building. From 10 a.m. to 1 p.m. an expo and open houses will take place at all schools, including the Salt Point Center (SPC).

SPC serves students pre-K through eighth grade by providing special education and a variety of support services. The school will host a sensory program in the gymnasium and have information about programming available for visitors. Staff will be providing building tours and sharing information about the trade skills learned at CTI and the sup-

ports and independent study offered at the Alternative High School.

Student work will be on display at all schools and information about the Adult Learning Institute, the GED testing site and other divisions will be provided to those who are interested.

Dutchess Community College will be hosting an "Instant Admissions" table for current high school students.

The job fair, which will be held in the new Conference Center, will feature more than 20 community partners who are now hiring. Students display impressive math skills at Pi Day event

On Tuesday, March 21, The Math & Physics Exploration hosted the 8th Annual Pi Day Recognition event. This year at the Van Wyck Junior High School, 59 students were recognized for their competence in being able to multiply infinite power series to prove algebraic identities. However, this year was special because a fifth-grade class of 21 students along with these 59 students were able to multiply 18 x 18 digits to get an answer of 35 digits.

Could this be the only class in Dutchess County, that can achieve such a feat? I am sure that they are willing to challenge any class that doubts this!

The students were asked to compare the approach that they learned with other techniques for doing long multiplication. They found that they could do the work three times as fast, and could be more confident that they had the correct answer. The students were learning how important the layout of a problem was to being able to understand what they were doing and being able to check and correct their work. They were encouraged to challenge what they were learning and to understand the strengths and weaknesses to different approaches for learning and doing long multiplication.

The success of teaching the students was how teachers Nelson, Patterson and Reaves - doing a residency with Dr. Irvin Miller, Executive Director of the Math & Physics Exploration - integrated Miller's techniques with theirs. Most importantly, the work ethic of the students improved as they began to be able to easily identify the associative, commutative and distributive properties.

In the spirit of STEAM, a project was introduced to all the students, in which they were asked to make a ruler that could be used to add and subtract positive and negative numbers. All they needed was some cardboard, a pen, glue and their creative skills.

The Pi Day program began as Superintendent Dr. Bonk and Assistant Superintendent Dr. Cardwell praised the students for their academic growth in learning math and their ability to transfer those skills to learning other subjects. Peggy Kelland, Vice President of the Wappingers Board of Education, continued the praises of Drs. Bonk and Cardwell, and discussed how appreciative she and the board were of their initiation and support of the Enriched Math Program. In gratitude for his interest in the efforts of the students, Mia from the 5th grade class presented Dr. Bonk with a picture she had painted.

The keynote speaker, State Senator Rob Rolison -- who has championed education even as Mayor of Poughkeepsie -- spoke about the importance of good quality education. He was pleased to see the future that these students would bring with their ethics and skill.

Town Supervisors Nicholas D'Alessandro (East Fishkill), Richard Thurston (Wappingers), Ozzy Albra (Fishkill) and Jon Baisley (Poughkeepsie) have been supportive of this program for about four years. Some of the aforementioned people, along with the students' principals, signed certifi-

cates of recognition. Dr. Shuchat through Theresa Maher provided the resources and skills to produce the trophies for the students.

The program continued as 5th grade teacher Nelson described the academic impact on her students as they changed as mathematicians, and improve their work ethic. Nicolette and her mom spoke about how importance math has been to their family. Her mom, Katherine, not only has been supportive of her daughter and son, but she learned some math from them. Nicolette saw how doing the homework and studying made math easier for her than for children who did not.

Sixth-grader Morgan from Fishkill Plains talked about the importance of practicing to perfect your skills. Johnny Price from Brinckerhoff looked forward to Tuesdays, when he could proceed at a new accelerated rate through the ever-increasing mystery of math. Dean from Oak Grove can now multiply large numbers that he could never have done without the program. Cillian from Oak Grove learned how to challenge what he was taught.
