The NY Excelsior John Jay FIRST Tech Challenge (FTC) Qualifier for robotics was held in the Wappingers Central School District on December 2. The tournament brought together high school teams from across the state to compete in the 2023-2024 season game, "Centerstage," presented by RTX. The event took place at John Jay Senior High School, in East Fishkill. The opening cer-

emony began at 10 a.m. The awards ceremony was held in the evening. There were 22 teams that were registered. FIRST, which is a non-profit organization, stands for "For Inspiration and Recognition of Science and Technology." FIRST was founded by Dean Kamen (also the inventor of the segway) in 1989.

The participants learn valuable STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Math) skills as well as the social skills

that are developed working in teams to accomplish goals," stated James Amodio, Conceptual Physics, Regents Physics and Project Lead The Way: Principles of Engineering teacher.

Teams at the competition were focused on both winning their matches and judging well in the areas of robot design, community outreach, it was stated.

## Pearl Harbor Remembrance Ceremony set December 7

On December 7th, inside the Veterans Memorial Building at 413 Main St. in Beacon, at 11 a.m. a Pearl Harbor Remembrance Ceremony will take place.

Harold Delamater, commander of the VFW Post 666 in Beacon, said, "a date which will live in infamy" per Franklin Delano Roosevelt."

"Eighty-two years ago, our Nation was attacked without provocation which led us into WWII. As a result, millions of people were killed," said Delamater.

According to the Library of Congress website, www.loc.gov, "On December 7, 1941, Japanese planes attacked the United States Naval Base at Pearl Harbor, Hawaii Territory, killing more than 2,300 Americans. The U.S.S. Arizona was completely destroyed and the U.S.S. Oklahoma capsized. A total of twelve ships sank or were beached in the attack and nine additional vessels were damaged. More than 160 aircraft were destroyed and more than 150 others damaged."

The information on the site about Pearl Harbor continues: "A hurried dispatch from the ranking United States naval officer in Pearl Harbor, Admiral Husband Edward Kimmel, Commander in Chief of the United States Pacific Fleet, to all major navy commands and fleet units provided the first official word of the attack at the ill-prepared Pearl Harbor base. It said simply: AIR RAID ON PEARL HARBOR X THIS IS NOT DRILL."


The Library of Congress also contains part of an interview from a woman who lived in California but was in Texas visiting relatives on Dec. 9, 1941. She stated: "'My first thought was what a great pity that... another nation should be added to those aggressors who strove to limit our freedom. I find myself at the age of eighty, an old woman, hanging on to the tail of the world, trying to keep up. I do not want the driver's seat. But the eternal verities—there are certain things that I wish to express: one thing that I am very sure of is that hatred is death, but love is light. I want to contribute to the civilization of the world but...when I look at the holocaust that is going on in the world today, I'm almost ready to let go...'"

"This is the second year we're running it (the tournament)," explained Anish, who is the president of the John Jay robotics team, The Jaybots.

"I think these tournaments are a great way to learn we're interested in engineering and a great way to find out about engineering," he said.

The John Jay Jaybots team did not compete in this specific tournament this year due to the fact they were hosting the event.

However, John Jay's B Team, "Phoenix Robotics," came in 17th place.

remarked a friend from soccer said that robotics was fun, which is how she decided to join the team.

"Once I got into the building aspect, I said 'really cool,'" remarked Rosie.

Ben Hoen is one of the coaches and a mentor for the RoboRaiders. He noted that at 7 o'clock the night before, the team's robot "had a few problems" and they resolved them.

"I think they're going to do great," said Hoen. He said the tournament "is spreading the word about robotics."

Head Referee Steve Kocik said, "the judges will look for a well-rounded team,"

## Jacobson applauds proposed EPA rule requiring replacement of lead water lines

Assemblymember Jonathan Jacobson (D-104) commended the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) proposal requiring all lead service lines be replaced. While the EPA has water standards regarding lead, this is the first time that the agency would require all lead-contaminated lines to be eliminated.

Among its many risks, lead poisoning impedes brain and bone development in children, and contributes to cardiovascular

and fertility issues in adults.

"There is no safe level of lead. The EPA's proposed rule will ensure that all children grow up lead-free," said Jacobson.

Jacobson has been a strong advocate of removing lead from drinking water. He led the fight in Albany to increase funding for New York's Lead Service Line Replacement program and co-sponsored the Lead Pipe Right to Know Act, requiring municipalities to identify any lead

contamination in their water systems.

In August, Jacobson joined a meeting arranged by Congressman Pat Ryan with officials from the EPA, the Department of Health, and the City of Poughkeepsie to discuss additional funding from the Federal Infrastructure and Inflation Reduction acts. He then followed up with the Cities of Newburgh and Poughkeepsie to ensure that they successfully applied for the funds.

"Given the current state and federal funding available, I expect that all lead-contaminated lines in the Cities of Newburgh and Poughkeepsie will be replaced well ahead of the EPA's proposed 10-year deadline," said Jacobson.




# Home Depot volunteers team up with local veterans on school project
