Two basic rules:

- The agreement must have legal purpose.
- If a contract is illegal, neither party can enforce the agreement, nor receive aid from the court.

Agreements that Violate Statutes

Civil and Criminal Statutes

- Agreements that require one to commit a tort or a crime are illegal.
- Agreements that protect one party from the consequences of torts or crimes are also illegal.



i.e. "Please allow my employee to disobey local speed limits as he has a job to do"




Usury Statutes

- **Interest** is the fee the borrower pays to the lender for using their money.
- Charging more than the maximum legal interest rate is **usury.** It is different in every state. (16% for <\$250k, 25% for >\$250k in NY).
- To charge more you must be a licensed lender.

- Illegal gambling could include cards, wagers or bets, or sports pools.
- Gambling can lead to bigger problems.











Licensing Statutes

- A **license** legal permission from the "state" allowing someone to carry on a certain trade or profession--contract is void if person is not licensed.
- A vendor's license may be required--contract is enforceable, but a seller without a license is subject to penalty.

Agreements Contrary to Public Policy

- A **restraint of trade** is a limitation on the full exercise of doing business with others. If unreasonable, the contract is void.
- Could be harmful to the public benefit.



Outright Contracts Not to Compete

- When buying a business you also buy the seller's **goodwill**--continued public approval and patronage of the business.
- May also include a restrictive covenant-promise not to compete in a certain area for a certain time.
- Also found in employment contracts
- Legal if not unreasonable.







